COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY

ORDINANCE NO. 20-11

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE REGULATION, CONTROL, AND ELIMINATION  
OF SOIL EROSION AND SEDIMENTATION RESULTING FROM LAND DISTURBANCE  
ACTIVITIES IN BULLITT COUNTY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE FISCAL COURT OF THE COUNTY OF BULLITT,  
COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY:

SUMMARY

**SECTION 1 – AUTHORITY**

Sets forth the legal authority for this Ordinance under Kentucky law, specifically KRS Chapter 67.

**SECTION 2 – PURPOSE/SCOPE**

Sets forth the purpose and scope of this Ordinance with respect to soil erosion and sedimentation resulting from land disturbance activities.

**SECTION 3 – DEFINITIONS**

Establishes definitions for terms used in this Ordinance.

**SECTION 4 – PERMITS**

Establishes the requirement for a permit for land disturbance activities of 1 acre or more, the activities exempted from said permit requirement, the application and form requirements, permittee responsibilities, fiscal surety requirements, notice of termination provision, KPDES Permit applicability, relationship to other applicable laws, and high quality water protection requirements.

**SECTION 5 – REVIEW AND APPROVAL**

Sets forth provisions regarding review and approval of permit applications by Bullitt County Code Enforcement, land disturbance activity start date requirements, permit effective period, and establishes Bullitt County Code Enforcement as the enforcement

agency.

**SECTION 6 – EROSION PREVENTION AND SEDIMENT CONTROL PLAN**

Establishes the requirement of an EPSC Plan to be submitted with a permit application and sets forth the applicable EPSC Plan requirements, including Best Management Practices.

**SECTION 7 – DESIGN REQUIREMENTS**

Establishes and sets forth minimum design requirements for EPSC measures.

**SECTION 8 – INSPECTIONS**

Authorizes inspections for compliance by Bullitt County Code Enforcement, and sets forth notice requirements, self-inspection requirements for permittees, and inspection report requirements.

**SECTION 9 – FEES**

Authorizes Bullitt Fiscal Court to establish an applicable fee schedule and requires the payment of any fees prior to permit issuance.

**SECTION 10 – ENFORCEMENT**

Establishes Bullitt County Code Enforcement as the enforcement agency for the provisions of this Ordinance and sets forth the enforcement process, including issuance of stop-work orders for violations, reinstatement, pursuit of legal remedies and appeal rights.

**SECTION 11 – PENALTIES**

Establishes penalties for violations of this Ordinance, including criminal and civil.

**SECTION 12 – INTERPRETATION**

This Ordinance shall be interpreted consistent with Kentucky law and applicable federal laws.

**SECTION 13 – INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES REPEALED**

All Ordinances which are hereafter found or determined to be in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed.

**SECTION 14 – SEVERABILITY**

Allows for severability of provisions as a result of an adverse court ruling.

**SECTION 15 – EFFECTIVE DATE**

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon passage and publication pursuant to law.

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deserves the Director position and has helped to transform that shelter into what it is today.

Gabriel King stated that she has volunteered at the Shelter since 2017, and has seen the abuse cases that are never justified. She stated that she has gotten to know Angie and she is patient and kind, and would trust her to hold her animal while she had to put it to sleep. She stated that she is here to advocate for Angie Greenup because she is special and has positively impacted our community.

Sharon Nutt gave the court petitions that have been signed by the community in support of Angie Greenup. She has volunteered for years at the shelter and past Directors did not want volunteering like Angie has embraced them. She stated that people have complained because they got caught, not because the action wasn't warranted. She is asking for answers from the court about why Angie was demoted.

Kristen Agurt spoke to Fiscal Court about the headlines that used to be about the Bullitt County Animal Shelter. Dogs used to be shot in the head and discarded. She stated that she has volunteered and fostered animals from Angie Greenup and we need to stand up for these animals who do not have a voice. She stated that Angie has saved over 50 dogs and has taken on dogs that have been severely neglected, needing extensive medical care and have held people accountable for these actions. She is asking the Court not to go backwards.

Shelly Osbourne stated that she has known Angie Greenup for years and believes she is a great asset to Bullitt County. She puts the animals first and sometimes doesn't sleep because she is too busy making sure the animals are taken care of. The shelter has went from a 98% kill rate to a 98% survival rate. She stated that just because two abusers said something bad about Angie, doesn't mean we kick Angie to the curb. They want her back.


Caitlyn Osbourne stated that she adopted a dog from Angie and has fallen in love with her. Taking away Angie's position is taking away opportunities for people to adopt. These animals have seen the darkness and they need some light.

Discussion was had amongst members of the Court, Judge Summers, and members of the Audience. The court stated that no one wants to kill these animals, only that Angie has been reassigned. They stated that it was not only because of those two individuals, but included other matters that surrounded this decision. They are not at liberty to discuss personnel issues to the public.
