ORDINANCE 23-04
 SMOKE DETECTORS

County Attorney Tammy Baker gave the first reading on Ordinance 23-04, relating to the installation and verification of working smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors in all Bullitt County residential dwellings. The second reading will be held at the next Fiscal Court meeting on March 21, 2023.

COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY
COUNTY OF BULLITT
ORDINANCE NO. 23-04

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE INSTALLATION AND VERIFICATION OF WORKING SMOKE DETECTORS AND CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS IN ALL BULLITT COUNTY RESIDENTIAL DWELLINGS.

WHEREAS, To provide for the health, safety, and welfare of Bullitt County residents, it has become necessary to require the installation of working smoke detectors and verification of same by owners of real property at the time of transfer or lease; and

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Court recognizes the unimaginable tragedy that recently befell a Bullitt County family and as such names this Ordinance, "The Eryn, Haisley, Raegan, and Holten Act."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE FISCAL COURT OF COUNTY OF BULLITT, COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY:

SECTION ONE: Definition. "Smoke detector" means a device that, when activated by the presence of smoke, provides an alarm suitable to warn the occupants within the individual dwelling unit in which it is attached and that has been listed for use by a nationally recognized independent testing laboratory.

"Carbon monoxide detector" means a device with an assembly that incorporates a sensor control component and an alarm notification that detects elevations in carbon monoxide levels and sounds a warning alarm and is approved or listed for the purpose by a nationally recognized independent testing laboratory.

"Dwelling" means any structure designed for single-family or multi-family residency, whether owner-occupied or tenant-occupied.

"Dwelling unit" means any single-family residence within a dwelling, as in a duplex, an apartment unit, or any other like unit.

"Owner" means the legal owner of any real property.

"Rental unit" means any dwelling or dwelling unit that is occupied by tenants, not owners.

SECTION TWO: Smoke detectors required.

(A) In all dwellings, smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors (hereinafter collectively, "detectors") powered by a hard wire AC primary power source or a self-monitored, non-removal ten-year lithium battery shall be installed and maintained after the effective date of this Ordinance. Single station detectors presently installed utilizing standard batteries may continue to be used as long as the units remain operational. Should an inspection of the concerned properties reveal these units out of service due to a low or no battery, it will be cause to replace the units with at least smoke detectors powered by a hard wire AC primary power source or a self-monitored, non-removal ten-year lithium battery.

(B) In order to comply with this Ordinance, only ionization or photoelectric type detectors listed by a nationally recognized testing laboratory shall be installed.

(C) Detectors shall be installed in accordance with applicable NFPA standards and the manufacturers recommendations. Smoke detectors may be ceiling or wall mounted, provided that they shall be mounted at a minimum of four inches and a maximum of 12 inches from the ceiling, and not closer than four inches from the point at which the ceiling and wall meet. Carbon monoxide detectors may be wall or ceiling mounted. There shall be no less than one carbon monoxide detector per story of any dwelling.

(D) In a dwelling unit, which contains a well-defined sleeping room separated from the other activity areas of the same unit, the detector shall be located in the corridor within the unit or interior area giving access to the rooms used for sleeping purposes. Where sleeping areas are separated and/or where a single detector will not adequately service all sleeping areas, there shall be a detector installed adjacent to each sleeping area. In a rooming unit the detector shall be centrally located.

(E) In a dwelling containing two or more dwelling units, in addition to the requirements for individual detectors in each dwelling unit or rooming unit, detectors shall be placed in centrally located common areas so that detectors will adequately service all sleeping areas. In multiapartment buildings three or more stories in height, approved detectors must also be installed in each corridor and hallway on each floor.

SECTION THREE: Noninterference. A person may not knowingly interfere with or make inoperative any smoke detector required by this section, except that the owner or the agent of an owner of a building may temporarily disconnect a detector in a dwelling unit or common area only for construction or rehabilitation activities when such activities are likely to activate the detector or make it inactive. The detector must be immediately reconnected at the cessation of construction or rehabilitation activities each day, regardless of the intent to return to construction or rehabilitation activities on succeeding days.

SECTION FOUR: Rental units. In a rental unit occupied under the terms of a rental agreement or under a month-to-month tenancy:

(A) At the time of each occupancy, the landlord shall provide smoke detectors if they are not already present. The smoke detectors must be in working condition. After notification, in writing, of any deficiencies by the tenant, the landlord shall repair or replace the smoke detectors.

(B) The tenant shall keep the smoke detectors in working condition by keeping charged batteries in the smoke detectors if applicable, by testing the smoke detectors periodically, and by refraining from disabling the smoke detectors.

SECTION FIVE: Transfer or Lease. Prior to transferring title to any real property, or leasing any rental unit, containing a residential building designed to be occupied by one or more families, the Transferor or Lessor of such real property shall present to the Transferee or Lessee an affidavit certifying that such residential building is

equipped with smoke detectors complying with this Ordinance. The following shall be exempt from the requirements of this subsection: (1) Any transfer from one or more co-owners solely to one or more of the other co-owners; (2) transfers made to the spouse, mother, father, brother, sister, child, grandparent or grandchild of the transferor where no consideration is paid; (3) transfers pursuant to an order of the court; (4) transfers by the federal government or any political subdivision thereof; (5) transfers by deed in lieu of foreclosure; (6) any transfer of title incident to the refinancing of an existing debt secured by a mortgage.

SECTION SIX: Enforcement. Upon request of a tenant or property owner, any fire district or fire department representative may enter a structure with consent to check for compliance with this Ordinance or to bring and install requested smoke or carbon monoxide detectors. Any fire district or fire department so acting shall bill the property owner the cost of this remediation up to \$100 per visit to the structure. Written notice shall be forwarded to the property owner of the cost. The letter shall also include instructions for voluntary reimbursement to the fire district or fire department. If not paid voluntarily, said cost may be recovered by the fire district or fire department through civil court action or through restitution in a criminal action as set out in Section Seven herein.

SECTION SEVEN: Penalties. Any person found to have violated any provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a Violation and shall face a fine of up to \$250 per violation with each day of noncompliance being a separate violation. Costs as permitted by Section Six herein shall be recoverable as restitution in addition to any fine assessed.

SECTION EIGHT: Severability. Should any section, subdivision, sentence or clause of this Ordinance be held unconstitutional or invalid for any reason by any court of competent jurisdiction, then such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holdings shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

SECTION NINE: Inconsistent Ordinances Repealed. All ordinances and resolutions, or parts thereof, to the extent they are inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed.

SECTION TEN: Publication Requirement. This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as required by law.

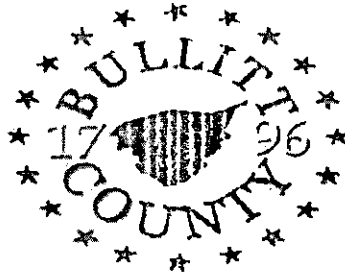

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING ORDINANCE 19-15 RELATING TO THE
REGULAR MEETING TIME AND PLACE FOR THE FISCAL COURT OF
BULLITT COUNTY, KENTUCKY.

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Court of Bullitt County has determined it to be advisable to change its regular meeting time;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Fiscal Court of the County of Bullitt, Commonwealth of Kentucky, as follows:

SECTION ONE: Meeting Time. The Bullitt Fiscal Court shall meet twice monthly. The first meeting of each month shall be held on the first Tuesday of the month commencing at 6:30 p.m. The second meeting of each month shall take place on the third Tuesday of each month commencing at 9:30 a.m.

SECTION TWO: Meeting Place. The Fiscal Court of Bullitt County shall continue to meet in the County Seat per KRS 67.080(1) located in the Bullitt Fiscal Court Room, Bullitt County Courthouse, Shepherdsville, Kentucky.

SECTION THREE: Severability. Should any section, subdivision, sentence or clause of this Ordinance be held unconstitutional or invalid for any reason by any court of competent jurisdiction, then such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holdings shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

SECTION FOUR: Inconsistent Ordinances Repealed. All ordinances and resolutions, or parts thereof, to the extent they are inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed.

SECTION FIVE: Publication Requirement. This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as required by law.


