

REGULAR SESSION BULLITT COUNTY FISCAL COURT
HELD ON TUESDAY, MAY 5, 2026, AT 9:30 A.M.

Judge Summers called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. and welcomed everyone. All Magistrates were present. Chief Financial Officer, Keith Griffee, gave the invocation and led the pledge to the flag.

MINUTES APPROVED

On motion of Esq. Johnson, seconded by Esq. Bleemel, and Fiscal Court having agreed to dispense with the formal reading, the minutes of the regular session of Bullitt County Fiscal Court held on Tuesday, April 21, 2026, were approved as presented and the Judge was authorized to sign same.

TREASURER'S TRANSFER REPORT

FISCAL COURT BILLS APPROVED

A zoning ordinance for property owned by Barry and Karen Crenshaw, has been advertised for first reading and public hearing at this meeting. Planning and Zoning Director Charlie Spalding gave the following overview of the Planning Commission's hearing and recommendation on Docket #2026Z-17:

- Ordinance #26-09; Docket #2026Z-17; Barry and Karen Crenshaw—an ordinance changing the zoning from Agricultural to R-1 Residential. The property in question is 3.7 acres, more or less, located at 8408 Thixton Lane, in an unincorporated area of the county.

The Planning Commission recommended that the zoning change be approved based upon the fact that the requested zoning change is in agreement with the adopted Comprehensive Plan.

The Planning Commission recommended that the zoning change be approved based upon the fact that the requested zoning change is in agreement with the adopted Comprehensive Plan.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Magistrate Bleemel stated that there is an issue on Old Highway 245 in front of the dollar store where they have put up trees and shrubs that are blocking the sight distance. He would like to look into this issue to see whose property line it falls on and to come up with a resolution. He also stated that he would like to look into the option of having one night meeting a month. He stated that City Council's meetings are held at night and allow citizens to attend in the evening and not have to take off work. Discussion was had amongst members of the Court regarding lack of additional attendance at our quarterly night meetings, and the lack of statements from the citizens regarding this request.

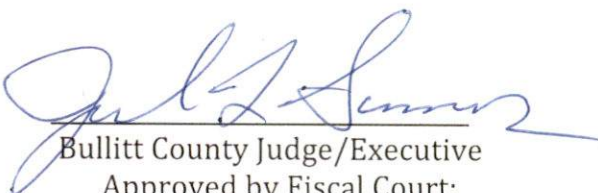
Magistrate Johnson discussed the Maryville Pool and the desire to have it reopened. She has been working on the reopening of the pool for years and has received several estimates, as well as a \$250,000

matching grant. Discussion was had amongst members of the Court regarding the State condemning the pool due to substantial issues, and the quote of \$2.1 million to refurbish the pool. Magistrate Johnson stated that she has gotten sponsors to complete most of the work and would only need \$500,000.00 for the repairs. Magistrate Logsdon stated that he was always for the Maryville Pool being reopened, but with the new 25-million-dollar aquatic center only five or six miles from the Maryville Pool, it does not seem like a good investment at this time. It would only be utilized by the neighboring citizens, not the county as a whole. Discussion was had regarding what the Parks and Recreation Board will suggest to the Court and waiting for their insight.

Judge Summers thanked everyone for coming and introduced Beraiah Marsh as a new Attorney at the County Attorney's Office. He reminded everyone to get out and vote on May 19, 2026.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business, on motion of Esq. Sanders, seconded by Esq. Logsdon, and following a unanimous vote, the meeting adjourned at 10:30 a.m.
